

The Word of Prayer

For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons, by whom we cry, "Abba! Father!" The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God. —Romans 8:15-16

Christmas can be a lot like a trip to camp—a spiritual high. January, then is like the bus ride back down the mountain, back to the grind—the mundane challenges of daily life. To that end keep alert with all perseverance, making supplication for all the saints" (Ephesians 6:18).

The Christian life is a battle that has been waged by millions for millennia. And God is faithful. One man, who stood up to the powers of darkness that ruled the powers that be in his day, testifies of God's ultimate triumph, which all believers share.

And though this world, with devils filed, should threaten to undo us,

We will not fear, for God has willed His truth to triumph through us.

His rage we can endure, for, lo, his doom is sure.

That word is our quiet prayer, uttered in faith to the "Word above all earthly powers," who entered our world at Christmas and walks with us in every challenge we face, every day that we live.
