## Redeemed: the Story of the Unfaithful Bride

**Introduction**: As God beckons Israel back to Himself through His redeeming love, constant unfaithfulness requires Hosea to go again and love a woman who is an adulteress. Today, adultery creates dramatic conflict for our sitcoms, and is a main headline of our news stories. Our culture embraces it. As one theologian puts it, "we are an adulterous generation." In a hostile culture we must answer questions like: How do we make sense of God's love for us? What are we really guilty of? And, who are the redeemed ones?
