
fact as you read the book of Jeremiah, because of all the doom and gloom it contains.

The great prophet's unenviable job was to pronounce judgment and dash any hopes Israel may have entertained about escape. They were faithless and would suffer the consequences for persistently violating their covenant bond with God. Unpleasant as it may be, we need Jeremiah's message. He reveals truth we prefer to deny—truth about ourselves and truth about our God. Look at Jeremiah 31.

Truth #1: God is always faithful no matter how faithless we are. 'At that time,' declares the LORD, 'I will be the God of all the families of Israel, and they shall be My people' (31:1). Israel had quit. They totally rejected their God. But even as certain judgment hit them like an avalanche, God insisted, *You shall be My people.* Israel had given up. God had not.

Truth #2: Rejoicing, not sorrow, is the ultimate reality. *Then they will come and shout for joy on the height of Zion, and they will be radiant over the bounty of the LORD—over grain and the new wine and the oil and over the young of the flock and the herd. And their life will be like a watered garden, and they will never languish again* (31:12). The horrors of sin and the sorrows of life are real. But these realities do not last. Eternal reality for the people of God is eternal rejoicing with Him.

Truth #3: It is because God is faithful that we suffer the consequences of our sin. *I have surely heard Ephraim (Israel) grieving, 'You have punished me, I was punished like an untrained calf. Bring me back that I may be restored.'* In His covenant with Israel, God promised to punish them for breaking His covenant. In no uncertain terms, Israel demonstrated with emphatic repetition that they would not be faithful. They would not keep their side of the bargain. Unless God punished Israel's sin, He would not be true to Himself or to His covenant with them.

So, when Israel proved faithless, how could God's relationship with them remain intact? How could God be faithful to His holy self and to His sinful people? That is a good question! And the Bible has the answer.

And we'll go into that in September.

Bible Reading Plan and Prayer Guide

(Year *THREE*) August 2018

If we are faithless, he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself.

—2 Timothy 2:13

Forever Faithful

It's easy to give up. Sometimes quitting seems like our only workable option. It may be our job or pursuing an education, often it's in our relationships. We reach a point where we're scrambling for the door. "I'm done!" Giving up sings the siren's song of freedom, escape, blessed release. So many people give in to the urge to quit. No wonder Solomon asks, *Who can find a faithful man* (Prov. 20:6)?

Then there's our relationship with God. Spiritual growth is fraught with difficulty. Obedience is especially hard, because in order to obey God, we have to disobey ourselves. When we find ourselves struggling again and again with the same weakness, stumbling into the same sin, we despair. Is true godly character possible? It's so foreign to our nature.

This struggle is an old reality. In fact, it's universal. An honest conversation with anyone on earth unveils this common difficulty. The aspiration to be better than we are along with our recurrent failure is proverbial. Any life we touch deals with this difficulty, usually through denial, blame, or despair. But Scripture confronts it head on.

In God's Word, there is no denial of the problem of human sin. It presents our rebellion as the central conflict of history. Nor does it let us get away with the blame game. Adam tried to blame Eve for his sin, but he couldn't evade his responsibility for his actions. Neither could Cain or David or Judas.

God deals with the struggle with despair throughout the history of Israel. There, the natural frustration with obedience plays out to its inescapable conclusion. Despite God's clear laws and His promised blessings upon obedience, His chosen people kept disobeying.

Yes there were great periods of hope—the glory days of David and Solomon, the revivals of Hezekiah and Josiah. But failure during these periods of genuine striving for obedience only accentuates the hopelessness of Israel's attempts to please God through their own efforts. First the Northern Kingdom, then Judah in the south, came to the place where they completely rejected God and His covenant relationship with them. They couldn't pull off obedience, so they quit.

But God didn't. Our God never gives up. He is forever faithful to Himself and to whoever belongs to Him. It's important to focus on this
