

Mighty to Save

Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. -Matthew 5:4

Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. —John 12:24

The ugly realities of life hit Peggy Covell in the face, when she learned of her parents' death. A missionary kid from the Philippines, Peggy was sent home to Colorado as World War 2 loomed in the South Pacific. For four years she waited in vain for news of their welfare, until she finally learned their fate. Her parents, Jim and Charma, had established a ministry in a remote valley in the Northern Philippines. Japanese invaders discovered their missionary compound, found their small radio, and executed them as spies.

Mourning mixed with rage, when Peggy learned of their brutal death, but then she learned that her parents had asked for 30 minutes to read the Bible and pray before they died. Knowing her dad and mom, their love for the lost and for the Japanese people, she realized that they spent the last 30 minutes of their lives asking God to forgive their executioners.

So how could Peggy do anything less? Soon, Japanese prisoners in a Colorado POW internment camp were receiving conscientious care from her hand. "Why are you doing this for us?" they would ask, only to be shocked by her reply. "Because the Japanese army killed my parents. But the Holy Spirit has washed away my hatred and has replaced it with love."

Peggy's story had repercussions she could never have anticipated, and thousands of former enemies came to Christ as a result of what God did in her heart.

Commander Mitsuo Fuchida was a warrior, inflamed with pride in his native Japan. The defeat and destruction of his homeland brought him shame and smoldering anger. Required to testify at the war crimes trials after the war, Fuchida was convinced that America was just as guilty of war crimes as Japan. So he began researching how America had treated their prisoners. In the process, he encountered Kazuo Kanegasaki, a former comrade in arms who had been imprisoned in Colorado.

Kanegasaki told Fuchida of an eighteen-year-old American named Peggy, who had cared for him during his imprisonment. He reported her loving care for the needs of Japanese prisoners of war. When Kanegsaki asked why she treated the prisoners so kindly, her answer—which we already know—stunned him.

Justice these warriors could understand, but Peggy's forgiveness was beyond their comprehension. Honor and family loyalty—values they held dear—would produce vengeance, not compassion. Fuchida had encountered something completely unexpected.

In October 1948, while boarding a train, he was handed a tract that told of Jacob DeShazer, an American prisoner in Japan. The bitter hatred he harbored toward his captors turned to compassion, after he read a copy of the Bible in prison. Fuchida began to read the Bible as well.

Its miracle accounts put him off, but he was drawn to its moral message. Then Mitsuo read Luke's account of the crucifixion. Christ's words on the cross, *Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do* (Luke 23:34), led him to new birth. At length, Mitsuo Fuchida became an evangelist. He even traveled and preached with his former enemy, Jake DeShazer, to thousands in Japan.

The love of God that motivated Jim and Charma Covell comforted the heart of their daughter Peggy, and their death bore much fruit in the ministry of Mitsuo Fuchida, who, by the way, was the pilot who had led the attack on Pearl Harbor. Our God is Mighty to Save!
