
There is a pitfall in prayer. In our petitions, our sinful souls change the pronouns to fit our priorities. “Your will, not mine be done,” so easily becomes “My will, not yours be done.” Like many a sincere believer, Hezekiah fell into this trap.

Late in life, Hezekiah became sick, and God told him to prepare for death. The righteous have every right to implore God for healing. In His love and wisdom, God allows our requests to affect His actions. Hezekiah pleaded to the Lord to prolong his life, citing all he had done to honor Him, and God graciously, miraculously, and immediately healed the king and gave him fifteen more years of life.

In response, though, Hezekiah used those years to pursue his will and abandon God’s. Two things stand out in his last years. First, apparently flattered when the king of Babylon sent messengers to congratulate him on his recovery, Hezekiah gave them a grand tour of his kingdom, showing them everything—armories, treasuries, silver, gold, spices—everything. He dangled Jerusalem’s wealth like bait before a shark, never considering the voracious appetite of Mesopotamian kings. In time, Isaiah warned him, Babylon would come and devour all the domains God had given him.

Hezekiah’s response betrayed his shortsighted priorities. “The word of the Lord which you have spoken is good,” he thought. “Is it not so, if there will be peace and truth in my days” (2 Kings 20:19)? Hezekiah was fine with the outcome, as long as it fit his plans.

Second, like so many Godly leaders, Hezekiah failed to pass his faith on to the next generation. His son Manasseh was born after his miraculous healing. As thorough as Hezekiah’s revival was, Manasseh undid it. He brought back all the idols his father banished from the land, even filling the Lord’s temple with statues of these impotent deities. It was Manasseh’s evil reign that sealed Judah’s fate and brought Babylon back to Jerusalem, not as friends but as conquerors and instruments of God’s judgment.

Like every king in Israel’s history, Hezekiah proves that the law is inadequate to produce righteousness, being weak through the flesh (Romans 8:3). Lesson number two: This weakness will always undermine our prayer, unless we follow in the example of the only perfect King, who prayed, “Abba! Father! All things are possible for You; remove this cup from Me; yet not what I will, but what You will” (Mark 14:36).

The true power of prayer is in surrender to God’s will. Only one Person ever truly put God first in His prayers, and we can only accomplish such perfect surrender by praying His way in His name.

Not My will, but Yours be done. –Luke 22:42

The True Power of Prayer

Hezekiah was a good king—one of the best in the history of Judah. Three books of the Bible tell his story: 2 Kings, 2 Chronicles, and Isaiah. All three cover essentially the same facts, telling about the revival he led, a deliverance God provided, and his prayer for healing late in life. This powerful story of a good man provides some profound lessons about prayer.

Hezekiah led a revival that was the greatest in history. He purged the land of idols and followed the Lord alone. “He clung to the LORD; he did not depart from following Him, but kept His commandments” (2 Kings 18:6).

More than any king before him, Hezekiah tore down all the high places of worship, so Judah would worship only in the Lord’s temple, as God intended. And God blessed his obedience. But God’s blessing didn’t exempt Judah from trouble. As the brutal Assyrian Empire swept south to destroy the wicked Northern kingdom, Jerusalem was surrounded as if by a flood. Hezekiah’s initial response was not trust but bribery.

It didn’t work. After he emptied the temple and his own house of gold and silver to give to Assyria’s king, Hezekiah still faced an ultimatum. Surrender or be conquered. Whatever he hoped to gain from his political maneuverings did not materialize. Hezekiah was in trouble. Except for one thing.

God was on his side, and God plus one equals a majority. In challenging Hezekiah, Assyria’s king made the fatal mistake of defying the God of Israel. “Do not listen to Hezekiah when he misleads you, saying, ‘The LORD will deliver us!’” (18:32).

God’s name was at stake. This arrogant Assyrian had defied the living God and told Him what He could not do, as if a mere mortal could establish limits for the God of the universe. Hezekiah knew God would not let such defiance stand. “Now, O LORD our God, I pray, deliver us from his hand that all the kingdoms of the earth may know that You alone, O LORD, are God” (19:19).

God acted decisively to defend Jerusalem and “save it for My own sake and for My servant David’s sake” (19:34). He sent an angel and destroyed 185,000 in Assyria’s army. When God decides to act, it’s good to be on His side! Lesson number one: The true power of prayer is its ability to align us with God’s will and make us participants in His plans. Thus, when God triumphs, we triumph with Him.

But we must be careful about our priorities. God’s plans are for His purposes, not ours. As His creatures, our prayers are for His will, not our own. It is God who is good, not us. Good comes from prayer that pursues and accepts His perfect will.
