

Walk in the Spirit

But I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh, for these are opposed to each other, to keep you from doing the things you want to do. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under the law. Now the works of the flesh are evident: sexual immorality, impurity, sensuality, idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, fits of anger, rivalries, dissensions, divisions, envy, drunkenness, orgies, and things like these. I warn you, as I warned you before, that those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking one another, envying one another. –Galatians 5:16-26

There's a war going on. We see it on the outside, in Ukraine and Israel and on more and more college campuses, but the war is inside as well. We experience it between people, in conflicts at home, at work, and with our neighborhoods. Most profoundly, though, this war rages within each of us, as we desire to do good, yet persistently lapse into behaviors that destroy the very good we seek. We're all engaged in this battle but what we see is only the surface tension in a war between titanic spiritual forces.

The societal, moral, and spiritual chaos we're experiencing these days are a current manifestation of the ages-old war of angels and principalities and powers, in rebellion against our God and Creator. Satan and His hordes refuse to bow and they've drawn humanity onto their side in the conflict. We each carry the conflict of the ages inside of us. There's no avoiding this war. We're helplessly locked in its death grip.

But God has put a choice inside Christian believers. Christ gave us His Spirit, and we have a choice to follow either Him or the desires of our flesh. The life of Christ that we received by faith when we first believed makes it possible to *walk by the Spirit* (Galatians 5:16) and be free from the power of the sin that's within us as humans. It's a matter of walking in step with the Spirit of God. It works like this.

We keep in step with the Spirit by ...

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- **Receiving God's forgiveness and cleansing:** *If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness* (1st John 1:9).
 - Imitating Christ's character: Be imitators of me as I am of Christ (1st Corinthians 11:1).
 - Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children. And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God (Ephesians 5:1-2).
 - Imitating Christ prays along with Paul that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead (Philippians 3:10-11).
- Relying on God's power: We don't imitate Christ by strength of will or in our own effort.
 - Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might. Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil. For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places (Ephesians 6:10-12).
 - Therefore, my beloved, as you have always obeyed, ... work out your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure (Philippians 2:12-13).
- Receiving God's direction: And I will lead the blind in a way that they do not know, in paths that they have not known I will guide them. I will turn the darkness before them into light, the rough places into level ground. These are the things I do, and I do not forsake them (Isaiah 42:16). He leads me beside still waters. He restores my soul. He leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake (Psalm 23:2b-3).

Prayer for This Week
