## Dear Northpoint Church Volunteer,

What a joy it is to serve alongside you in the ministry at Northpoint Church! Your willingness to give of your time, your gifts, and your heart for the people of this congregation is a beautiful reflection of the grace of God at work among us. It is a privilege to call you a co-laborer in this great work.

## Why We Are Asking for Your Fingerprints Now

As a church that loves and cares for children and youth, we are required under **California Assembly Bill 506 (AB 506)** and applicable provisions of the **California Penal Code** to conduct Live Scan background checks — including fingerprinting — for all volunteers who work with minors. AB 506, which took effect in 2022, requires youth-serving organizations to ensure that every person in a supervisory or volunteer role with children undergoes a thorough background screening. This is not merely a formality; it is a legal obligation we take seriously and gladly fulfill.

During a recent review of our child protection policies, we found that we were not up to date with AB506. To that end, we began conversations with denominational leaders, and sister churches, as well as legal counsel. This process ensures we are up to date with AB 506.

But beyond legal compliance, we believe this process is also a matter of faithful stewardship. In Matthew 18:5–6, Jesus speaks with unmistakable clarity about the high value He places on children, and the gravity with which we must guard them. Psalm 127:3 reminds us that children are a “heritage from the Lord” — a sacred trust. By taking every reasonable step to protect the children and youth in our care, we are not simply following the law; we are honoring the heart of our Lord.

## How the Fingerprinting Process Works

We have worked hard to make this process as simple and convenient for you as possible. Here is a brief overview of what to expect:

- 1. Complete the Forms in this Packet.** As part of this process, there are two simple forms we’ll ask you to complete. The first is the Waiver Agreement (BCIA 9018), which gives Northpoint Church permission to collect the necessary personal information. The second is the Request for Live Scan (BCIA 8016), which is the form you’ll fill out and bring with you to your fingerprinting appointment.

**2. Mark your Calendar.** Bring your completed form and a valid, government-issued photo ID on a day we are doing fingerprinting on campus. We will have a mobile Live Scan service on our church campus on **May 31** and **June 28**. If you cannot make it on either of these days volunteers can get their fingerprint done at Rivera Live Scan located at 1047 W 6th St #D, Corona, CA 92882.

**3. Submit and Wait for Clearance.** Once your fingerprints are submitted electronically, the Department of Justice (DOJ) and, where applicable, the FBI will process your background check. Results are typically returned within a few business days (5-7 days). Our ministry leaders will contact you if you are cleared to serve in one of our ministries that work with minors.

**4. Associated Fees Covered by the Church.** There is a processing fee associated with Live Scan. However, Northpoint will cover the fee.

## **A Personal Invitation to Follow the Packet Closely**

The remainder of this packet contains everything you need to complete this process smoothly. You will find a 1-page rationale for why fingerprinting is good for our ministries, two forms, and key dates for getting fingerprinted on our church campus along with contact information. We want to personally encourage you to read through each section carefully and follow the directions as given. If at any point something is unclear, please reach out to our church office — we are here to help.

Thank you for your patience, your cooperation, and above all, your love for the people of Northpoint Church. What you do matters eternally. We are grateful for you, and we are honored to serve together for the glory of God and the good of our community.

# WHY WE FINGERPRINT

## *A Biblical & Theological Case for Protecting Our Children*

Fingerprinting our youth and children's workers is not merely a legal requirement — it is an act of faithful stewardship over the children God has entrusted to our care. Here is what Scripture and Christian theology say about why this matters deeply to us.

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### WHAT SCRIPTURE SAYS

Jesus Himself issues a solemn warning:

*“Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me, but whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone fastened around his neck and to be drowned in the depth of the sea.” — Matthew 18:5–6 (ESV)*

Jesus speaks with extraordinary gravity here. To expose a child to harm carries the severest of consequences. Safeguarding our children is a direct response to the seriousness of this warning.

God defends the vulnerable:

*“Give justice to the weak and the fatherless; maintain the right of the afflicted and the destitute. Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked.” — Psalm 82:3–4 (ESV)*

Children are among the most vulnerable members of any community. God explicitly and passionately defends the vulnerable — and our church policies should reflect His character.

Biblical wisdom demands prudent precaution:

*“The prudent sees danger and hides himself, but the simple go on and suffer for it.” — Proverbs 22:3 (ESV)*

Seeing a potential danger and taking action to prevent it is not fear or distrust — it is the way of the wise. Fingerprinting is exactly this kind of prudent, proactive protection.

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### THE THEOLOGICAL CASE

- **The Imago Dei** — Every child bears the image of God (Genesis 1:27). This is a declaration of their infinite worth and dignity. Any system that better protects that dignity is an act of worship.
- **Covenant Trust** — Families who bring their children to our church make an act of profound trust. That trust is a covenant obligation. Fingerprinting is how we honor it with integrity and transparency.
- **Honest Stewardship of Sin** — Scripture teaches that no one is beyond the capacity for self-deception (Jeremiah 17:9). Fingerprinting is not an accusation against our workers — it is a humble acknowledgment that structures of accountability protect everyone: the children, the workers, and the church.

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### A WORD TO OUR VOLUNTEERS

Submitting to fingerprinting is itself an act of Christlike humility and service. It says:

*“I care more about the safety of these children than I care about my own convenience.”*

That is the posture of a servant-leader, and it honors God.

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*“He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God.” — Micah 6:8 (ESV)*

Pursuant to the Penal Code section 11105.3 and the National Child Protection Act, as amended by the Volunteers for Children Act, this form must be completed and signed by every current or prospective applicant, employee, or volunteer, for whom criminal offender record information (CORI) is requested by a qualified entity under these laws.

I may obtain a prompt determination as to the validity of my challenge before a final decision is made.

## REQUEST FOR LIVE SCAN SERVICE

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### Privacy Act Statement

**Authority.** The FBI's acquisition, preservation, and exchange of fingerprints and associated information is generally authorized under 28 U.S.C. 534. Depending on the nature of your application, supplemental authorities include Federal statutes, State statutes pursuant to Pub. L. 92-544, Presidential Executive Orders, and federal regulations. Providing your fingerprints and associated information is voluntary; however, failure to do so may affect completion or approval of your application.

**Principal Purpose.** Certain determinations, such as employment, licensing, and security clearances, may be predicated on fingerprint-based background checks. Your fingerprints and associated information/biometrics may be provided to the employing, investigating, or otherwise responsible agency, and/or the FBI for the purpose of comparing your fingerprints to other fingerprints in the FBI's Next Generation Identification (NGI) system or its successor systems (including civil, criminal, and latent fingerprint repositories) or other available records of the employing, investigating, or otherwise responsible agency. The FBI may retain your fingerprints and associated information/biometrics in NGI after the completion of this application and, while retained, your fingerprints may continue to be compared against other fingerprints submitted to or retained by NGI.

**Routine Uses.** During the processing of this application and for as long thereafter as your fingerprints and associated information/biometrics are retained in NGI, your information may be disclosed pursuant to your consent, and may be disclosed without your consent as permitted by the Privacy Act of 1974 and all applicable Routine Uses as may be published at any time in the Federal Register, including the Routine Uses for the NGI system and the FBI's Blanket Routine Uses. Routine uses include, but are not limited to, disclosures to: employing, governmental, or authorized non-governmental agencies responsible for employment, contracting, licensing, security clearances, and other suitability determinations; local, state, tribal, or federal law enforcement agencies; criminal justice agencies; and agencies responsible for national security or public safety.



## REQUEST FOR LIVE SCAN SERVICE

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### Noncriminal Justice Applicant's Privacy Rights

As an applicant who is the subject of a national fingerprint-based criminal history record check for a noncriminal justice purpose (such as an application for employment or a license, an immigration or naturalization matter, security clearance, or adoption), you have certain rights which are discussed below.

- You must be provided written notification<sup>1</sup> that your fingerprints will be used to check the criminal history records of the FBI.
- You must be provided, and acknowledge receipt of, an adequate Privacy Act Statement when you submit your fingerprints and associated personal information. This Privacy Act Statement should explain the authority for collecting your information and how your information will be used, retained, and shared.<sup>2</sup>
- If you have a criminal history record, the officials making a determination of your suitability for the employment, license, or other benefit must provide you the opportunity to complete or challenge the accuracy of the information in the record.
- The officials must advise you that the procedures for obtaining a change, correction, or update of your criminal history record are set forth at Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Section 16.34.
- If you have a criminal history record, you should be afforded a reasonable amount of time to correct or complete the record (or decline to do so) before the officials deny you the employment, license, or other benefit based on information in the criminal history record.<sup>3</sup>

You have the right to expect that officials receiving the results of the criminal history record check will use it only for authorized purposes and will not retain or disseminate it in violation of federal statute, regulation or executive order, or rule, procedure or standard established by the National Crime Prevention and Privacy Compact Council.<sup>4</sup>

If agency policy permits, the officials may provide you with a copy of your FBI criminal history record for review and possible challenge. If agency policy does not permit it to provide you a copy of the record, you may obtain a copy of the record by submitting fingerprints and a fee to the FBI. Information regarding this process may be obtained at <https://www.fbi.gov/services/cjis/identity-history-summary-checks>.

If you decide to challenge the accuracy or completeness of your FBI criminal history record, you should send your challenge to the agency that contributed the questioned information to the FBI. Alternatively, you may send your challenge directly to the FBI. The FBI will then forward your challenge to the agency that contributed the questioned information and request the agency to verify or correct the challenged entry. Upon receipt of an official communication from that agency, the FBI will make any necessary changes/corrections to your record in accordance with the information supplied by that agency. 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## Frequently Asked Questions

Summer 2026

*We know that being asked to complete a fingerprint background check can raise questions — and that is completely understandable. Below are answers to some of the most common questions we anticipate from our volunteers. Our desire is that you feel fully informed, genuinely cared for, and confident as you step into this process. If your question is not answered here, please do not hesitate to contact the church office — we are always happy to help.*

### **Q1: Why does the church need my fingerprints now?**

California Assembly Bill 506 (AB 506), which went into effect in January 2022, requires all youth-serving organizations — including churches — to conduct Live Scan background checks on volunteers who work with minors. This is a legal requirement, and Northpoint Church is committed to full compliance. Beyond the law, we believe that background screening is simply good stewardship of the children and families God has entrusted to our care. During a recent review of our child protection policies, we found that we were not up to date with AB506. To that end, we began conversations with denominational leaders, and sister churches, as well as legal counsel. This process ensures we are up to date with AB 506.

### **Q2: What is a Live Scan fingerprint check, and how is it different from a regular background check?**

A Live Scan is a digital, inkless fingerprinting process that submits your fingerprints electronically to the California Department of Justice (DOJ) and, when required, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Unlike a basic background check that searches only by name and date of birth (which can produce errors or miss records), Live Scan uses your unique fingerprint data to conduct a highly accurate search of criminal history databases. It is the most reliable method available.

### **Q3: I have nothing to hide — do I really need to do this?**

We are so grateful for that heart! And yes — this process applies to every volunteer who serve with minors, regardless of background or history. This is not a statement of suspicion toward anyone; it is a consistent, church-wide standard designed to help us care well for the children entrusted to us and support those who serve them. Completing this process helps ensure we are maintaining a safe and responsible ministry environment for everyone involved.

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### **Q4: Who will have access to my background check results?**

Your results are handled with strict confidentiality. The California DOJ transmits results directly to Northpoint Church's designated Authorized Receiving Agency (ARA). Only the church's authorized administrator (Custodian of Records) will review the results — the specifics of the results will not be shared with other staff, volunteers, or congregation members. Results are kept in a secure, locked file in compliance with state law. In the event of disqualification, according to Northpoint's Live Scan Policy Guide, the COR and ministry leader will inform the volunteer of disqualification.

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### **Q5: Will my personal fingerprint data be stored by the church?**

No. Northpoint Church does not store your fingerprints. The Live Scan process is electronic — your fingerprints are transmitted digitally to the DOJ and are not retained in any form by the church or the Live Scan operator. Only the resulting clearance determination is kept on file at the church.

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### **Q6: What if my background check reveals something from my past?**

We understand this question can feel tender, and we want to approach it with the pastoral care it deserves. Having a prior record does not automatically disqualify you from serving. Each situation is reviewed individually, with compassion and discernment, in accordance with AB 506 guidelines and our church's Policy Guidelines. We encourage you to speak privately with a pastor or ministry leader before submitting if you have concerns. You are not alone in this.

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### **Q7: Is there a cost, and will the church help cover it?**

Yes, there is a processing fee associated with Live Scan (typically a DOJ fee plus a rolling fee charged by the fingerprinting site). The church will fully cover the cost of getting fingerprinted.

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**Q8: How long does the process take, and when do I need to complete it?**

The Live Scan appointment itself typically takes 5-10 minutes. Once submitted, DOJ results are usually returned within 5—7 business days, though it can occasionally take longer. We ask that all volunteers complete their fingerprinting before the start of the ministry year. Specific deadlines are noted in your packet. Please do not wait — starting early ensures there are no delays in your ability to serve!

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**Q9: I was fingerprinted at a previous job or for another organization. Can I use that?**

Unfortunately, no. California law requires that the Live Scan submission be specifically authorized and submitted by Northpoint Church as the requesting agency. Previous submissions on file with the DOJ for other employers or organizations cannot be transferred or re-used. You will need to complete a new submission using our church's specific ORI (agency) number, which is printed on your Request for Live Scan Application in this packet.

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**Q10: How often will I need to be re-fingerprinted?**

Under AB 506, volunteers are required to complete the initial Live Scan clearance before serving with minors. California law also requires ongoing monitoring through the DOJ's Subsequent Arrest Notification service, which automatically notifies the church if a cleared volunteer has a new arrest. As a result, you generally will not need to repeat the full Live Scan process each year, though we may ask you to renew if you have a significant gap in service or if regulations change.
